AN EXTRAORDINARY TRAGEDY

His consciousness was gone, but life lingered until Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Young remained in her room and did not go near him. One of the boys was away in lowa, and it is not known whether he is yet informed of the tragedy. The other two were there, but are said to have acted as disinterested spectators.

Observers saw no tears in their eyes. His daughter, sick and broken-hearted, at Lancaster, could not leave her room.

An inquest on the murdered body found two bullets in the body, and they thought there was a third. One passed through the left wrist. The funeral was on Monday attended by thousands. Mrs. Young went into the room and looked at the corpse, as others did, when the coffin lid was last off-her only visit.

Albert was buried on Saturday morning in a field 200 yards from the house. Neighbors objected to putting him in the public burying-ground.
